

Learning Style Results - Visual

Description

Illustrations, images, pictures, graphs and charts are all tools that help visual learner's remember and understand. The brighter and flashier the better as visual distinctiveness increases recall.

Ideas for Adults

- You will want a [Bible](#) with charts, maps and other images. Each time you study God's word use a map, timeline, chart or other image to give you some visual cues about what you are studying.
- Consider getting some extra visual guides to go along with your Bible studies. You can get [atlases](#), [dictionaries](#), and other [guides](#). The more pictures and colors there are, the better.
- Keep a drawing journal with your Bible. As you read God's word, summarize chapters or sections by drawing pictures and pictograms. Use lots of color.
- **Highlight** and underline in your Bible. If you have a WIDE margin, it would even be helpful to take notes directly in your Bible.
- **Color code things**. You could underline characteristics of God in blue, examples of faith in green and commands in yellow. It doesn't matter how you categorize things, the key is to use lots of color.

- Imagine it. When you read or hear the Bible, picture what it would look like. Was it outside? Were there a lot of people? What did the people look like? Get as detailed as possible.
- Write verses you are memorizing on note cards and hang them all around your house. Add colors and pictures

Ideas for Kids

- Make sure your child has a [Bible](#) that has a lot of colors and pictures.
- You may want to invest in some supplemental materials like Bible [timelines](#), [atlases](#), and illustrated [encyclopedias](#).
- Use pictures and illustrations during worships or other times. The visual aids don't need to be professional looking – you can make them yourself. Just remember, the more colorful they are, the more helpful they will be.
- Use other visual aids. For example, if you're child is learning about the story of the good Samaritan, provide bandages or other visual cues that may help him to remember the story.
- Encourage your child to draw pictures of what he is studying.
- When learning memory verses, hang posters or note cards all over the house with the child's verse on it. Try to include lots of pictures, especially if she can't read yet.
